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

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About BATEP

The Bay Area Training and Exercise Program (BATEP), launched by the Bay Area Urban Areas Security Initiative (BAUASI) in 2020, provides grant-funded training and exercise services for Bay Area jurisdictions and their partners to build and sustain core capabilities to prevent, protect, respond to, and recover from terrorist incidents and catastrophic events.

BATEP Guiding Principles

Program administrators, training coordinators, and staff ensure that BATEP maintains:



A transparent and inclusive process through the Bay Area UASI’s Training and Exercise Work Group to determine training priorities, funding allocations, and region wide exercise opportunities.



Prioritized training and exercise activities derived from and aligned with the National Preparedness Goal, the Bay Area Threats and Hazards Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and the Bay Area Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).



An ongoing opportunity for whole community partners to coordinate regionally on training and exercise opportunities.



A balanced offering of training and exercise opportunities for all public safety disciplines.



A commitment to enhancing preparedness, response, and recovery capabilities of community-based organizations throughout the Bay Area UASI region.

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
2023 TRAINING

Training activities are offered across the public safety disciplines of Fire Service, Law Enforcement, Public Health, Emergency Medical Services, Emergency Management, Cybersecurity, Public Information, Public Safety Communications, Domestic Violent Extremism and Community Preparedness. In-person trainings are geographically distributed throughout the Bay Area UASI region and follow local public health orders.

Launched in 2019, the Community Sector Seminar Series is designed to increase resilience in Bay Area communities by promoting collaboration between government and community partners, and strengthening the disaster preparedness, response, and recovery capacity of the whole community. Core seminars customized for community organizations include Personal Preparedness for Staff, Organizational Preparedness, Incident Command System, and Continuity of Operations.

Additional Seminar Topics offered upon request include Community-Government Coordination Panels, Volunteer and Donations Management, Disaster Financial Planning, Psychological 1st Aid, VOAD/COAD Response Roles, and Long-Term Recovery Best Practices.

HIGHLIGHTS

- During the 2023 Winter Storms, BATEP facilitated a government-CBO coordination panel in San Benito and Monterey counties. Participation included 47 attendees from 31 different nonprofits and government agencies.
- In 2023, BATEP increased its outreach to communities of faith providing 5 seminars focusing on Hazards Overview, Emergency Planning, Disaster Management, Intruder Security, and Psychological First Aid. These classes reached 85 participants and 65 unique communities of faith, nonprofits, and government departments.
- Looking forward to 2024, BATEP will increase the variety of offerings and begin to offer some seminars in Spanish!



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2023 EXERCISE

The BATEP exercise program strives to engage the whole community in building a more resilient Bay Area. The BATEP includes a variety of public safety focused exercises allowing first responders to hone necessary life-saving skills. Capstone exercises such as Golden Eagle provide an opportunity for multiple levels of government, non-governmental, and faith-based organizations to implement, operate, and evaluate regional coordination in a simulated catastrophic disaster response.



Hazardous Materials Operational Readiness Drills

In January 2023, the Bay Area UASI hosted a series of four Hazardous Materials Operational Readiness Drills held in Contra Costa, San Francisco, Santa Clara, and Santa Rosa. Exercise participants conducted field identification of at least three unknown industrial chemicals, practiced atmospheric monitoring and radiation monitoring, and performed intervention activities that included containment or neutralization of toxic material.

Golden Eagle Exercise

The Bay Area’s annual Golden Eagle Full-scale Exercise was conducted on May 18th, 2023, and focused on pandemic response operations following an outbreak of a highly transmissible and infectious variant of the mpox virus. The scenario included multiple wildland fires burning throughout the region. Exercise participants included 19 Bay Area counties and cities, the California Governor’s Office of Emergency Services, non-governmental organizations, and community groups. The Bay Area Joint Information System and radio teams activated to practice coordination and test emergency communications technologies.

K9 Full Scale Exercise

On November 29th, the Bay Area UASI conducted a High Yield Explosive Detection Mutual Aid Exercise at the San Francisco International Airport (SFO). Participants included the Transportation Security Administration (TSA), SFO Emergency Management, FBI, as well as K-9 teams from SFO, the Oakland International Airport, and the San Jose International Airport.



CERT Rodeo

(Community Emergency Response Team)

In June 2023, Bay Area UASI funded a CERT Rodeo at the National CERT Conference which included 10 stations through which 113 CERT members practiced skills such as fire suppression, medical treatment, radio communications, triage, and search and rescue.



CBRNE Decontamination

The Bay Area UASI conducted two CBRNE Decontamination Equipment Drills for healthcare facilities receiving decontamination equipment through the Bay Area UASI. The drills included practical demonstrations of Powered Air-Purifying Respirators (PAPRs) and setup and tear-down of decontamination setups.



C-POD Exercises

(Commodity Point of Distribution)

BATEP conducted 4 tabletop exercises allowing 5 operational areas to vet and practice newly developed C-POD site activation plans. Plan validation templates and continued contractor support remain available to local agencies to identify planning gaps, confirm agency roles and responsibilities, and practice distribution of life-sustaining commodities in a disaster response.






